#### FROM THE MINISTERIAL SEARCH COMMITTEE

#### What We Want in a Minister

The Wy'east Ministerial Search Committee has been hard at work, and it's time for another update. The Committee has had several meetings where we reviewed results of the congregational survey and focus groups, and we discussed our priorities for the qualities we are seeking in a minister. We then reviewed the 5 applications we received by our deadline of November 15. We conducted several interviews via Skype, and we are in the process of gathering more information.

An important (and interesting) part of our process has been the input provided by Wy'east members and friends, which helped us discern the qualities we seek in a minister. We want to share some of this information.

When asked what qualities would make an ideal minister, the congregation identified three important areas: our ideal minister would have exceptional interpersonal, spiritual and administrative skills. Oh, and by the way, the minister would be active in making the world a better place.

#### What We Want in a Minister

Our preferred new minister has been described as a high energy, charismatic leader who will take the time to listen to us and learn about us before implementing their own model. He or she would act as a facilitator or coach who gently guides us to our common goal. This guidance will require flexibility and the ability to handle conflict. Most of all, they must be a caring person who is easy to relate to as if they are one of us.

Our preferred spiritual leader would deliver energetic, inspiring sermons in a manner that will challenge us intellectually and spiritually. The new minister should also know how to get things done in a timely and organized way while using their skills to handle differences of opinion. Ideally, the person would have contacts with the Unitarian Universalist hierarchy and social justice organizations that could help us achieve our goals.

Social and environmental justice is very important to us. The new minister should have a history of involvement with organizations that support these causes so that they can lead the congregation in further involvement.

We on the Search Committee can't guarantee that our final candidate will have all of these qualities all of the time. However, we are aiming to get as close as possible so that Wy'east will grow in spirit and numbers, and so, be able to make an even greater difference in this world.

# Youth Ministry throughout the Pacific Western Region

In the Mountain Desert District and the Pacific Northwest District, we have created **Multicultural Support teams** that are charged with creating programming at youth events to support intercultural sensitivity and awareness. They also promote caucusing opportunities for our Unitarian Universalist (UU) youth of color. This is a small step toward making our youth communities more inclusive, but a necessary one nonetheless.

There is a **new scholarship process** for youth events in the Pacific Western Region (PWR). This process engages youth, their families, congregations, and beyond (district and regional resources) to ensure that all four support systems play a role in an individual's participation. The scholarship acknowledges that when youth are transformed by these spectacular, faith forming offerings, they return bringing new skills and abilities, which contribute not only to the youth, but to their families, congregations, and wider communities as well.

The **Multicultural Leadership School** is now called "Thrive", and this amazing opportunity will be coming to the Pacific Western Region July 9-13, at First Unitarian Denver. This immersion experience is for our youth of color and has been lauded as truly transformative.

And we are proud to announce that the PWR will be hosting a **Youth Ministry Summit** called "Engaging Spiritual Practice" September 23-25th at **First Unitarian Portland**. The youth and adult attendees will look at various ways to practice our faith via many methods, tapping into our historical roots and embodying youth ministry best practice models. Rev. Tandi Rogers is our keynote speaker, and we have an amazing cadre of support staff including worship genius, Rev. Dr. Jonipher Kwong, musician, Matt Myers, leadership guru and Director of Faith Formation, Jessica Laike, among many others! Teams of adults and youth are encouraged to attend from UU congregations both within the PWR and across the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA). Registration will open in early 2016! Whereas others see only statistics, we see strong individuals, tomorrow's business owners and leaders, teachers and citizens. We help our students see themselves and their potential the same way. Then we help them find their strengths, ignite their passion and identify the plan that will move them in the direction of their dream. This long-term investment pays off, as does the depth of personal relationships between students and their SEI Coordinator, and comprehensive programs including inschool, after-school, and six-weeks in the summer.

Urban Nature Partners PDX empowers youth from underserved neighborhoods through building long term mentoring relationships and providing access to meaningful outdoor experiences. Mentor-

youth activities take place in easily accessible outdoor areas in and around Portland, are driven by the interests and abilities of each youth, and are relevant to a young person's culture and background. Group events include their family members so everyone gets to enjoy all that our great urban greenspaces have to offer.

UNP-PDX incorporates the best practices of traditional mentoring in establishing meaningful, long-term relationships that help young people build confidence,

resiliency, problem solving skills, social competency, and academic success, as well as help prevent problem behaviors. It also draws upon best practices in education and outdoor recreation by providing informal environmental learning through direct inquiry and experience and by building a sense of place through the exploration of one's natural environment.

Combining the best of these disciplines together in one program provides young people with a uniquely relevant and long term series of opportunities that build better health and well being, teach them about the outdoors and potential career opportunities, and help them become empowered to make their own decisions and succeed in other parts of their young lives.

## Social Justice Highlights

Wy'east as a congregation is active in several different aspects of social justice, but in this column our Social Justice Committee would like to highlight what's being done out in the community by some of our individual members on their own time. Each newsletter may include one or more write-ups, with a brief description of an organization that someone from Wy'east supports and how they are involved. If you want to know more about the organization, please contact the person that is highlighted.

**Barbara R.** volunteers at the Reentry Transition Center, a program run by Mercy Corps for recently incarcerated individuals. It provides for immediate assistance such as housing referrals, meals, and clothing, plus some long term goals like employment assistance, counseling, parenting, and family reconciliation. Barbara has organized visits for state legislators to familiarize them with the work done there. She's also a greeter, spending time with people who are waiting to see the staff, making them feel comfortable and welcome. The RTC was the recipient of this year's collection by the UUA General Assembly here in Portland.

Jon B. volunteers with the Oregon Organizational Development Network, which works with nonprofits on processes that allow them to run better, spend more time on their missions, and meet their goals. He assists with mission statements, strategic plans, vision statements, board development, open-ended conversations (including being willing to ask the critical questions), seeing strengths, and realizing opportunities. Jon has been involved in ten projects with organizations in the environmental and social justice fields. If you know of an organization that might benefit from this kind of assistance, he welcomes you to contact him.


