From the Minister

Unitarian Universalist General Assembly is coming to Portland!

General Assembly, or GA, is the annual meeting of the Unitarian Universalist Association. Part business meeting, part social gathering, part educational experience, GA is a time when four to six thousand UU's from across the continent come together. This year's GA will be held at the Oregon Convention Center June 24th-28th.

Each GA features large worship services, business meetings to discuss social justice concerns that the Association will take on, and workshops led by ministers, lay folk and UUA staff. Special events include the Ware Lecture, with this year's presenter Cornel West; the Service of the Living Tradition that celebrates new and retiring religious professionals in our movement; and a special Sunday Morning Worship Service. The event also includes a chance to work with a local organization—this year it's the Reentry Transition Center, run by Mercy Corps, that helps previously incarcerated people integrate back into the community.

The Service of the Living Tradition and the Sunday Morning Worship Service are open to the public, but admission to all other events requires registration. Early registration is suggested—not only because it offers a significant cost saving, but because Portland is one of the most popular locations for GA. Last held here in 2007, we had the largest attendance ever. Early registration for the entire event is \$350, with one-day options also available. *(Continued on page 2)*

A great option to consider is volunteering. Volunteers who work 24 hours over the 5 days of GA get free registration. Jobs include ushering, registration, recycling patrol, ambiance, and local greeters and information people. If you are interested in volunteering, please contact Lana A. from Wy'east, or the Volunteer Coordinator, Ed A. from First Unitarian. (Ed's email is posted on the bulletin board at Wy'east.)

Another local opportunity to consider is offering home hospitality for visiting UU's. If you have a separate bedroom with a bed and can offer simple breakfasts, Wy'east can earn \$65 per night. Please contact Lana A. or Barbara D. to learn how to apply to be a home host.

I urge you to consider attending—even just for a day. The opportunity to worship with thousands of Unitarian Universalists alone is an amazing experience. To this end, Wy'east will not be having a Sunday service on June 28th, instead encouraging all to attend the free service at GA.

If you can, consider registering and attending some workshops and business meetings as well. The opportunity to see what UU's across the continent are doing is inspiring and educational. Hearing from people from congregations of different sizes and geographical locations, learning best practices, and hearing the business of the association all have connected me to a broader base of Unitarian Universalism. I wholeheartedly encourage everyone to consider this opportunity.

The Wy'east Board generally meets on the second Sunday of the month at 4:00 pm (sometimes 3:30 or 4:30) at a board member's home. If you are interested in attending a meeting, you can call the Wy'east office at (503)777-3704 and leave a message or send email to wyeast-board@googlegroups.com. Someone will get back to you with location and exact time. Or, you can ask any board member at a Sunday service.

What is the Wy'east Board of Trustees?

The Wy'east board of trustees is the governing body of the Wy'east congregation. It consists of five members elected by the members of the congregation during the annual meeting in May. Two board members are elected in even years and three in odd number years. Newly elected board members begin their two year term on July 1. Members may only serve for two consecutive terms.

Simply stated, the board is responsible for decisions related to and administration of the business affairs of the congregation. This includes proposing an annual budget and making expenditures as specified in the approved budget. The board determines the duties and compensation of all employees. With the exception of the minister, the board appoints and has the power to dismiss all employees.

Who is eligible to serve on the board of trustees?

Anyone who has been a voting member of Wy'east for six months and is eighteen years of age or older is eligible to be nominated and elected to the board of trustees. The candidates may be nominated by the nominating committee or may run by petition. A list of candidates is prepared by the nominating committee.

What is expected of board members?

Board members are expected to attend monthly meetings and participate in the tasks of the board. The average time spent by a board member is six hours per month. The board moderator and treasurer will spend more time than this average.

Board members are signatories of Wy'east bank accounts and are expected to be available to sign checks to pay employees and bills.

Missioning Process Coming to Wy'east!

Our board has decided it's time for Wy'east to develop a new mission statement. This is not a five-year plan, and doesn't replace our covenant. Rather, it's a process to come up with a clear, concise statement of what role Wy'east hopes to have in the world. Who are we? What is our reason for being? What do we want to do together?

This process will be facilitated by a consultant who will help our members brainstorm ideas, which will then go through a process of consideration and distillation. The process will be collaborative and engaging. We hope folks will consider what Wy'east means to them and consider what we wish to do together.

On Sunday, March 8, 2015, there will be a special congregational meeting to approve changes to the bylaws. It is a legal requirement that Wy'east operate in accordance with our bylaws. Recently we have made some operational changes, and therefore we must revise our bylaws to reflect those changes. The meeting will be held at 12:30pm, at the end of our potluck brunch. Please plan to stick around for a few minutes to attend the meeting. It will be brief, and we need a quorum. All are welcome to attend, but only members may vote. Special Collections for March and April

March: **VERDE**

From www.verdenw.org: Verde serves communities by building environmental wealth through social enterprise, outreach and advocacy. Since 2005, Verde has involved community members in the planning and building of these investments, and ensured that low-income people and people of color benefit directly. Examples of green investments include greenspaces, habitat, energy efficiency and renewable energy, green streets, stormwater management facilities, environmental education and green jobs. In 2010 Verde, Hacienda Community Development Corporation, the Native American Youth and Family Center and Habitat for Humanity formed an innovative collaborative in the Cully neighborhood, Living Cully, which reinterprets sustainability as an anti-poverty strategy, as it braids environmental investment with social, economic and equity benefits. One of Living Cully's signature projects is the conversion of a former landfill into a 25-acre park: Cully Park.

We value environmental stewardship, community empowerment, integrity, equity, and leadership. At OREP we put our passion for our values into direct action, educating the public, working with partners, diving into the weedy details of proceedings at the Oregon Public Utility Commission and Northwest Power and Conservation Council, and developing smart legislative concepts that remove barriers and promote widespread ownership of renewables. In 2011 HB 3516 established rooftop solar energy systems as an outright permitted use in Oregon; in 2014 SB1520 opened the path to cooperative ownership of solar installations throughout our communities.

Spring Beach Clean-up

The **SOLVE Spring Beach Clean-up** will be Saturday, March 28th. The Mt. Hood Cluster of UU Congregations (eight congregations in NW Oregon and Vancouver, WA) has participated as a group for several years, cleaning a beach designated for us and then gathering for a potluck afterward. We are doing it again this year, at the same beautiful beach as the past few years—Boy Scout Camp Meriwether beach, several miles south of Tillamook. From 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. we will gather to act on our Seventh Principle, and help take care of one little part of our earth. The report from the Park Ranger who coordinates that section of the coast is that this beach is in particular need of cleaning, due to this winter's storms and tides.

After the clean-up, those who wish can gather at a sheltered area at Cape Lookout State Park Beach for a potluck lunch. Usually we bring a basic lunch for ourselves, with desserts, snacks, etc. to share with all. A great opportunity to meet UUs from other congregations in our area!

RE Update

The Wy'east Religious Education program has three levels of classes for children to attend on Sunday mornings based on grade level. The youngest group are ages Preschool through 2nd grade taught by Kimberlee King with assistance by Willow Buswell. In this class children are taught the foundations of Unitarian Universalism and the 7 principles through guided exercises, activities and crafts. The middle group are ages 3rd through 6th grade and are taught by alternating teachers Alex Reed and Tode Oshin. In this class the children are learning the *Windows and Mirrors* curriculum designed by *Tapestry of Faith*. The highest level of RE programming is the Junior High group for ages 7th through 9th grade taught by alternating teachers Anders Liljeholm and Barbara Dow. Anders has now finished teaching the Bible from a UU perspective. The youth will finish the year reading Buddhist stories and short koans that the kids have enjoyed in the past. On the other Sundays Barbara Dow will teach about social justice using lessons from *Tapestry of Faith*.

Randy Woodley and his family are Native Americans who have recently been displaced from their own homeland, losing everything due to racism and a justice system privileged for Whites. Randy is Distinguished Professor of Faith and Culture and Director of Indigenous and Intercultural Studies at George Fox Seminary. He and his wife Edith teach on land justice, Indigenous spirituality, and co-sustainability (among other things) from their farm in Newberg.

TEN CORE NATIVE AMERICAN VALUES

(45 tribes, all geographies from Randy Woodley's PhD Dissertation)

1. **Tangible Spirituality/Our Spirituality Must Be Practiced**

- Belief in the Great Mystery/Creator
- All Creation is both Natural and Spiritual
- Continue to be Involved in Ceremonies and Traditions
- Support of tribal Societies, They Are Vital
- Use of Symbols in Everyday Life
- Authority comes from Reflected Experience, Not From Information

2. **Our Lives Are Governed by Harmony**

- Seek to Maintain Balance in All of Life
- Life in Harmony is Expressed as a Circle or Hoop
- Seek Peace
- Humans are Mostly Good with some Evil
- Fear is a Catalyst for Virtue

3. **Community is Essential**

- Women are Sacred
- Children are Loved
- Elders are Respected
- Family is Vital
- Everyone is Integrally Related

4. **Humor is Sacred and Necessary**

- Both Impromptu and Designed in Ceremony

5. **Feeling of Cooperative/Communality**

UUA GENERAL ASSEMBLY

General Assembly is GREEN! Look for a write up of several years' effort at making GA a more sustainable event in the Alaska Airlines magazine for January 2015. And look for volunteer opportunities with the Greening group at the event. Our goal this year is **80%** diversion from landfill!

It's time to be choosing your congregation's delegates.

While GA is for everyone, delegates have the added privilege and responsibility of representing your congregation in deliberations on important issues. This year, **Congregation Presidents** who serve as delegates will also get a **\$100 rebate** on their full-time registration.

March is the month to apply to be a GA volunteer.

GA volunteers get free GA registration in return for 24 hours of volunteer service at GA for adults, 14 hours for youth. The application forms will be posted on www.uua.org/ga on **March 2**. Volunteers need to apply **by March 31**. So if you want to be a volunteer, don't miss that deadline! Think about it and get ready by checking out the volunteer opportunities at <http://www.uua.org/ga/registration/financialaid/14930.shtml>. GA runs on volunteers-we need them!

GA Registration & Housing Reservations open March 2.

If you register before **May 1**, you get a lower registration rate. (You can pre-register through mid-June and even walk in and register onsite, but why not make up your mind early and take advantage of the **March-April discount**?)

For **housing**, you'll find a selection of hotels, dormitories, and UU home hospitality to choose from, at a range of prices. Descriptions of the housing options will be posted soon on www.uua.org/GA. Again, you can sign up for housing anytime, but the early bird may have a better choice of worms.

March is the month to apply for Financial Aid.

If you want to attend GA but can't afford it, talk to your congregation leadership now. Don't be shy, apply! In addition, applications for UUA financial aid will be available **March 1**, and most are due by **March 31**. Here's what's available from the UUA:

- **Congregational Matching Grant Scholarships** provide free registration and a match of your congregation's contribution toward your attendance, up to \$250. You'll need to have a recommendation and financial pledge from your congregation when you apply, so now is the time to talk to your church board. - **Youth and Young Adult Scholarships** provide free registration and up to \$500 toward expenses. Just like for volunteering, the application deadline is **March 31**.
- There are also a limited number of competitive \$1000 **Youth Group Scholarships** for youth groups who have gotten organized to raise money and bring most of their group to GA. Check out <http://www.uua.org/re/youth/events/gacaucus/56024.shtml>
- **Davidoff Fund Scholarships** cover the cost of GA registration for lay delegates from congregations who have not been represented by lay leaders at GA in the last three years. The application period is March 2 through April 30. Application form is online from last year. Max award is \$500.
