If you haven't yet seen *The Martian*, 2015's number eight top movie at the box office, I hope that you will soon. It is beautifully filmed, brilliantly acted, and elegantly conceived. Maybe it would have made number one if it had included some monsters. I'm glad that it didn't. Don't get me wrong—I like monsters and will be telling you a lot of stories with monsters in them. They are a staple of religious narratives from around the world, and I actually think it's healthier when scriptures pit human communities against a marauding monster instead of against each other (with a god or gods openly taking sides in the conflict!).

But there are no monsters in *The Martian*. In fact, there are no enemies. There are people who disagree with each other, quite strongly at certain moments, but never do they actively work against the well-being of their fellow human creatures. That's pretty extraordinary in the world of film or in the world today as a whole. There are no enemies, but there is a hero, and I don't mean Matt Damon's character, as soulfully rendered as he is.

At one point Damon's character—trapped alone on the red planet with limited ways to make his food last until any possible rescue might be expected—says that the only way he can survive is to "science the hell out of this situation." He will have to reason, study, observe, connect. And so will those who set out to help him. There's nothing "cold" about this—it's reasoning with heart, reasoning supported by intuition, risk-taking, and creativity. What a breath of fresh air, especially in our current U.S. election season! Reason has not been doing well at the "box office" of many political rallies, interviews, or ad campaigns.

The Martian is part science fact and part science fiction. In this month's sermons I'll share some reflections on the sci-fi genre, along with a monster story from a pre-scientific society. Keep reading to see what's coming in June! I hope you will find these offerings helpful as you pursue a path that is reasonable, and also true to your heart—which is not a bad description of the UU way, as I see it!

Upcoming Informational and Annual Meetings

Every year in May we have a formal meeting of the members of Wy'east to conduct the business of the congregation:

May 15: Budget Discussion. Each year, a week or two before the Annual Meeting, we have a congregational conversation to discuss the budget that will be considered at the Annual Meeting. This is when the treasurer – D'On this year – summarizes our financial situation as the current fiscal year ends and presents a draft budget for the next fiscal year for discussion. Based on the discussion at this meeting, D'On may revise the draft budget so that the board can recommend a budget to be voted on at the annual meeting.

May 22: Annual Meeting. Items on the agenda include election of board members and nominating committee members for the upcoming year, approval of the proposed budget for the upcoming year, approval of the minutes of the meetings of the congregation in the past year, and an annual report of the activities of the congregation.

Both these meetings will be after the Sunday service following a brief time for coffee and snacks. Anyone who has been a member of Wy'east for more than 30 days and who has made a contribution of money, material, or labor in the past 15 months is entitled to vote at a congregational meeting. Wy'east's bylaws provide for both voting by absentee ballot and designating a proxy to act on a member's behalf at a meeting. To request an absentee ballot contact Barbara S-T. To designate someone as your proxy, give them a signed statement prior to the meeting authorizing them to act as your proxy. A member is allowed to serve as proxy for up to 6 other members.

May: AIDS ORPHAN EDUCATION TRUST (AOET)



From the website, www.aoetusa.org:

Child welfare is the core challenge most hurting families within AOET and Africa in general face. The well-being of children and women at an individual/household

level, especially those affected by HIV/AIDS, is critical if a community is to develop. A healthy community is one where children and women have access to a few essentials, but mainly health care and education. Through our community based representatives and the local leaders, we assess who a vulnerable child/woman is and earmark them for either formal schooling or skills training; and for many adults, income generating activities and family support as found appropriate (all related to helping a child go to school).

June: AMAMANTAR y MIGRAR

Amamantar y Migrar (Breastfeeding and Migration) is an oral history project designed by Latina immigrant mothers to share their own stories about the impacts of migration and immigration



policy and enforcement on infant-feeding practices among immigrant families. This is an exciting opportunity to elevate the voices of Latina immigrant mothers in the conversation around immigration policy, reproductive justice, and maternal, infant, and public health. The project aims to increase public consciousness, promote immigrant mothers' autonomy and self-determination, and advance efforts to improve the rights and health of immigrant mothers, infants and communities.

Social Justice Highlights

Wy'east as a congregation is active in several different aspects of social justice, but in this column our Social Justice Committee would like to highlight what's being done out in the community by some of our individual members on their own time. Each newsletter may include one or more write-ups, with a brief description of an organization that someone from Wy'east supports and how they are involved. If you want to know more about the organization, please contact the person that is highlighted.

Jocelyn F. volunteers with the Leaven Organization, a spiritual and community organizing non-profit. She is involved in two initiatives, affordable housing and Community Building. In the affordable housing area she is working with the "Cully Housing Action Team" that is trying to avoid resident displacement and preserve affordable housing in the diverse Cully neighborhood. Currently the Cully neighborhood has a mix of apartments, single-family homes, trailer parks and urban farms. Examples of some of the work of Leaven include assisting in obtaining roofing materials for a house that needed a new roof and building a wheel chair ramp, both of which resulted in people staying in their existing homes. A current challenge is a trailer park, which may be sold for development, and the current tenants it would displace.

Elizabeth S. volunteers with MACG, the Metropolitan Alliance for Common Good, a community organizing group composed of metropolitan Portland organizations, including those that are faith based, OHSU students and labor unions. MACG's purpose is to bring people together to organize about and take action on important issues in common, which include: housing affordability, prison equity - concerning the rights of prisoners and people with criminal records, Latino organizing, and health equity - which addresses local and state health care policies. Elizabeth is working on the housing team, which has contacted the legislature to increase affordable housing, testified at the state capitol, and organized a letter writing campaign to the current legislators.

Amamantary Migrar (Breastfeeding & Migration) is an oral history project designed by Latina immigrant mothers to share stories about the impacts of migration and immigration policy and enforcement on infant-feeding practices among immigrant women.

Our **Mother's Day 2016 Month of Art & Action** will bring together a diverse group of immigrant mothers and families, public health workers, advocates for immigrant, gender, and reproductive justice, and policy-makers in the Portland metro-area for a bilingual (Spanish-English) **multi-media exhibit** designed by a cohort of Latina immigrant mothers living in Oregon who will share their stories and experiences of migration, motherhood, and breastfeeding through a combination of photography, audio collages, and personalized albums featuring interview excerpts, objects, and images.

While migration is a global phenomenon, and figuring out how to feed one's infant is a nearly universal experience, there's remarkably little research, writing or art exploring connections between the two. Yet the embodied and affectively potent narratives of immigrant mothers quickly surface impacts of migration and immigration policies on their infant-feeding practices/options.

Some mothers struggle to feed their babies on the arduous and unpredictable journey across the border. Others are separated from their breast-fed infants through detention and deportation. Many undocumented immigrants are forced to return to work within days of giving birth, while threats of retaliation and potential deportation prevent them from advocating for their right to maternity leave and to pump at work. Agricultural workers are exposed to pesticides that leach into breast milk. Sometimes mothers find greater access to information and infant-feeding support in their new countries.

Our Mother's Day Month of Art & Action is an exciting opportunity to elevate the voices of Latina immigrant mothers in the conversation around immigration policy, reproductive justice, and maternal, infant and public health. We hope this project will increase public consciousness, promote autonomy and self-determination and advance efforts to improve the rights and health of immigrant mothers, infants and communities.








Painting


