Our autumn holidays touch us in ways that are spiritually deep, but have few sectarian overtones. They transcend the boundaries of any single religious tradition and invite us to some delightful feasts that are open to all. Halloween, the Day of the Dead, and All Souls' (or All Saints') Day run from October 31 to November 2. The festivities are all so familiar that we hardly notice how strange it is that they are also very child-friendly.

Skulls and bones, headstones and...*laughing children*? Beyond all the cheap plastic junk, behind all the commercialism, here is something quite profound. We bring together two sides of human experience that we usually try to keep as far apart as possible: childhood and death. During these holidays, symbols of death become symbols of welcome. Trick or treat, what's to eat? It's bats and worms and sugar skulls! And all this makes for a wholesome banquet. Wholesome, not because of the sugar, but because it embraces the whole of life, from childhood to the grave—and beyond.

UUA Disaster Relief Fund

Our UU friends and neighbors in California, Florida and the Caribbean—including Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands—have experienced extraordinary devastation following Hurricanes Irma and Maria, as well as the fires in California.

We invite you to contribute to the UUA Disaster Relief Fund (formerly the Hurricane Irma Recovery Fund) so the UUA can provide financial assistance to UU congregations impacted by these and other natural disasters. In addition to facilitating their own disaster recovery, congregations receiving disaster relief funds will have discretion to provide financial assistance to their members, as well as to support local partner organizations serving the community at large. The Church of the Larger Fellowship (CLF) may apply on behalf of CLF members living in disaster areas.

Puerto Rico's situation is especially severe. To contribute aid beyond the Unitarian Universalist sphere, there are many organizations on the ground doing important work, such as the Hurricane Maria Community Relief & Recovery Fund and United for Puerto Rico, a collaboration between the Government of Puerto Rico and the private sector; or consider supporting the Community Foundation of the Virgin Islands Relief Fund.

We know that long after the initial clean-up, real recovery can take months or years. Your donations will allow the UUA to respond flexibly to this tragedy and to new situations as they arise.

Through this work, the organization hopes to reduce the gender imbalance in the tech industry and address the negative impacts of that imbalance on women in the field. Mentorships with PDXWIT provide women in technology with opportunities for professional development through community partnerships. Mentors serve as role models, sources of support, and help with problem solving. kindle tiny lights and whisper secret music,

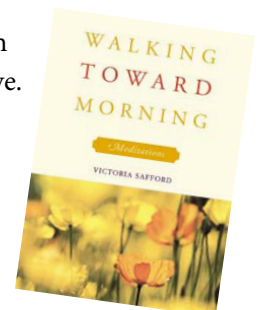
and here's a blessing:
