The Religious Education calendar also turns over in September, and this year brings many new faces to our program. Lana is leaving her job as our setup person and childcare provider to focus more on her business and on our young adult group. Ashley is leaving her position as our Director of Religious Education/Lead Teacher, because she's been working more than full time for several years now, and it's time for her to devote more time to her personal life and other projects. Both women will continue to be an active part of our Wy'east community, and we look forward to seeing them in worship!

We are pleased to report that we have hired two new people to fill these positions. Our new DRE is Kimberlee King who is a student at Portland State. She comes to us from Mt. Diablo UU Church in Walnut Creek, California where she has worked as a childcare assistant, childcare lead and substitute RE teacher. She has also been on the Youth Council for the Pacific Central District and held the RE portfolio for that group. Kimberlee will teach our youngest kids and coordinate our RE program.

Our new setup and childcare person is Willow Buswell. Willow currently practices as a Licensed Massage Therapist and works as a nanny & babysitter. She has been an occasional visitor to Eastrose UU Congregation, where a friend sings in the choir. Her references describe her as reliable, caring and creative in her approach to children.

In the midst of these new hires, we also need RE volunteers from the congregation. Alex is ready to move off of the committee that he has been chairing for three years now, and we need a few more teachers. We are looking for congregants who are interested in working with our kids two or three times a month, teaching our 3rd-6th graders, or our middle school kids, or helping out with childcare. We also need some folks who are willing to serve on the RE committee, which entails monthly meetings with the teachers, staff & minister, and helping to plan our RE curriculum. If you are interested in any of these positions, please talk to Alex or Marcia. Teaching our kids about Unitarian Universalism is one of the most meaningful ways in which you can explore and deepen your own faith. Come let your own light shine!

Special Collections for September and October

September: **SOLAR FORWARD**

Wy'east member Karl A. writes: "During my recent trip to Massachusetts, I saw solar panels on an old mill building that is now home to a restaurant. The sight of modern solar power on a 120 year-old stone building was impressive. It tells everyone driving by that this is what our future can look like. Most people have TVs. Most people have cell phones. Of course, in Portland, everyone recycles and even composts. And, of course, we need solar power. The more the better. The faster, the better. That brings us to our Special Collection...."



Solar Forward, created by the City of Portland, is Portland's first solar crowd-sourcing program. It offers you the chance to help fund

new, local renewable energy assets, reduce carbon pollution, put local people to work installing PV (photovoltaics) systems, and pave new ways for collectively powering our future with clean energy. Solar Forward is raising money from community members to match seed funding from the Oregon Community Foundation and launch Portland's first revolving solar fund. The first installation was at the Southwest Community Center. The next is slated for Lent Elementary School on SE 97th. And the third is planned for Hacienda CDC, a Latino community development corporation on NE Killingsworth.

October: LENTS SPRINGWATER HABITAT RESTORATION PROJECT

In 1995, Ed Kerns had a vision to coordinate tree plantings for kids along the Springwater Corridor in the

Lents Neighborhood where he grew up. So he began the Lents Springwater Habitat Restoration Project organizing and managing regular plantings. Native trees and



shrubs are planted along the Springwater Corridor – a 35 mile "Rails to Trails" Park that leads from downtown Portland up into the foothills of the Cascade Mountains. These plantings are done by volunteers from around Portland, but primarily by the kids of the Lents neighborhood – from schools such as Kelly and Lent Elementary, Lane Middle School, as well as Lents Boys and Girls Club and the Lents Little League. During the past 19 years this project has planted over 50,000 native trees and shrubs during 200 plantings with 5,000 local kids and 3,000 adults.

Wy'east Chooses Environmental Justice

The Wy'east Board has chosen Environmental Justice as the theme for our special collections and speakers for the the 2014-15 church year. This follows our tradition of focused generosity and awareness building.

Environmental Justice follows naturally on last year's theme of racism, because it represents the coming together of the Civil Rights Movement and the Environmental Movement, since it so often happens that people with minority racial status and low income bear an unfair portion of the burden of environmental challenges. For instance, this has been the case in siting inner-city heavy industries, waste facilities, and the use of pesticides in the presence of farm workers.

Recent decades have seen a formalization of more appropriate guidelines in the Environmental Protection Agency and the US Department of Agriculture.

Wy'east will take a broad view of Environmental Justice: simply put, we are looking to support organizations and initiatives that directly benefit people as well as the environment. We want to give attention to both local issues and matters of global importance. If you know of organizations or individuals that might be right for Wy'east, please bring them to the attention of anyone on our task force working with this — Jon B., Karl A., Kathryn H., Mabel P., and Mark A.

We hope you will look forward to hearing Environmental Justice stories, supporting the causes, and reading our newsletter articles. With all of us in this together, Wy'east WILL make a difference.

Announcing the 2014-2015 UUA Common Read

(From www.uua.org) **Reclaiming Prophetic Witness: Liberal Religion in the Public Square** by Paul Rasor is the 2014-2015 UUA Common Read. In this inspiring call to action, Rasor dispels the myth that conservative Christianity is the only valid religious voice in national debates on social policy, and shows us that the powerful support of religious liberals may be more numerous than we realize.

A Common Read invites participants to read and discuss the same book in a given period of time. A Common Read can build community in our congregations and our movement by giving diverse people a shared experience, shared language, and a basis for deep, meaningful conversations.

Indígenous Peoples Day

(From www.uua.org) The Unitarian Universalist faith calls us to fully understand the legacy of Christopher Columbus, just as it calls us to respect and learn from indigenous peoples and support their struggles for social justice and religious freedom. Join Unitarian Universalists across the United States in honoring Indigenous Peoples Day.

History of the Holiday

"Indigenous Peoples Day" reimagines Columbus Day and changes a celebration of colonialism into an opportunity to reveal historical truths about the genocide and oppression of indigenous peoples in the Americas, to organize against current injustices, and to celebrate indigenous resistance. The idea of replacing Columbus Day with Indigenous Peoples Day was born in 1977, at a U.N.-sponsored conference in Geneva, Switzerland, on discrimination against indigenous populations in the Americas. Fourteen years later, activists in Berkeley, CA, convinced the Berkeley City Council to declare October 12 a "Day of Solidarity with Indigenous People." Henceforth, there has been a growing movement to appropriate "Columbus Day" as "Indigenous Peoples Day."

States such as Alaska, Hawaii, Oregon, and South Dakota do not celebrate Columbus Day, and more cities have taken similar action.

Indigenous Peoples Day is Monday, October 13th.
