From the Minister...

During a half-day retreat this summer, the worship committee came up with a vision statement of what we wish to create in worship.

"We want to create a welcoming place where people can relax into a safe, warm space where they can be refreshed, renewed, inspired, and challenged to build loving community, discover and engage with their faith, and live out their values in the world."

We had a rich discussion of what that meant for our members, our friends, and our visitors, and how that could be embodied in the service. One of the things we discussed was Joys and Sorrows. What is the goal of this part of the service? How is this practice meeting this goal? Are there other practices that could meet this goal as well, or better, than our current one?

One of the things we discussed was that what we do now obviously works better for some people than others. Extroverts who are comfortable in our community often enjoy this ritual. Other people never get up and share. How are we meeting their need to uphold loved ones in community, or to have a private moment of ritual?

From the Minister (continued)

As a result of this conversation, we have decided to expand Joys and Sorrows a bit. First, beginning in mid-September, we will have a space dedicated for individuals to light candles before the service, with a greater degree of privacy. This is a chance for people to light a candle of concern for a friend or family member, to offer thanks for a moment of joy, or in support of a personally meaningful cause. We will have a white board available if you wish to note what your candle is for, and others are encouraged to hold those people in prayer or good thoughts as well. We will encourage people to do this in lieu of some of the current Joys and Sorrows candles, and also offer it as a way to light a candle for those who don't wish to go up on stage.

Another option we will offer is that on the Sundays when Marcia is preaching, she will offer a pastoral prayer that incorporates a space for people to speak aloud the name of a person, or a concern (for example, employment) that they would like held up by the congregation. This will be a good choice for people who wish their concern or their loved one supported by public, community prayer and good wishes.

On the Sundays when Marcia isn't preaching, our usual practice of Joys and Sorrows will remain. We do encourage people to be judicious in their sharing, simply because congregants, and especially visitors, can experience overload when too many people rise to light candles. As a general rule, we ask that individuals share less than once a month, and that these public



candles are reserved for major events. We are hopeful that with our new rituals, people's needs for ritual and sharing can be met in other ways as well.

Wy'east Special Collections

OUR THEME FOR THE YEAR

Each year for the past several years, Wy'east has had a theme for our monthly Special Collections, going to support the efforts of mostly local organizations doing good work. This past year, in line with one part of the Unitarian Universalist Association's campaign called Standing on the Side of Love, we donated to Portland and Oregon groups working with immigrants and refugees. This year, in honor of a second part of that same campaign, we are going to donate to groups supporting the LGBTQ community (lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer or questioning).

What that will look like is that on the third Sunday of most months this year, we will not only be raising funds for LGBTQ organizations, but inviting someone from those groups to present their programs to us for a few minutes during the services on those days. This is very much a win-win for the presenters and Wy'east, as they get to be acknowledged and we get to be educated.

In addition, as we did last year, Wy'east will continue to have a speaker on our theme every other month as well. This also works to deepen our understanding of the theme.

PORTLAND TWO SPIRIT SOCIETY



In **September**, our first Special Collection of 2011-2012 will be for Portland Two Spirit Society. From their website: "Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer and Intersex (LGBTQI) are a few terms that describe

sexuality and sometimes gender roles. Two Spirit is a term that describes both a traditional Native role as well as sexuality. Two Spirit is a term that many LGBTQI Natives claim as their own, as it encompasses the totality of who they are. Two Spirit is a term that recognizes an equal balance of male and female and doesn't define an individual as one or the other but fluid in both, thereby allowing a broader role in the Native community. Traditionally in many tribes, Two Spirits were the name givers, the historians, healers, leaders, etc., and they were allowed to live as everyone else."
