February: HABITAT FOR HUMANITY - PORTLAND METRO EAST



Habitat for Humanity Portland/Metro East revitalizes neighborhoods, builds affordable and sustainable homes, and empowers families through successful homeownership. The vision of Habitat is for "a world where everyone has a decent place to live." In addition to their well-known homeownership program, Habitat offers home repair services to low-income homeowners, using the same affordable payment and sweat equity model as a strategy to preserve affordable housing and keep people in their homes. In Northeast Portland, Habitat for Humanity Metro East has been active in broader neighborhood revitalization, anti-displacement efforts, and advocacy for housing justice. The organization is one of the members of the Living Cully coalition, which in 2015 organized and fundraised to purchase a former strip club and turn it into a community center. Living Cully reinterprets sustainability as an anti-poverty strategy by concentrating environmental investments at the neighborhood scale and braiding those investments with traditional community development resources.

Wy'east member Jocelyn shares, "I live on one of the Cully neighborhood's many unpaved roads. In the winter of 2013, the potholes had gotten so bad that I was

awoken one morning by a neighbor knocking on my door: her car had gotten stuck in the mud, and she needed help pushing it out. In 2014, as part of the first Rock the Block event, Habitat organized a group of volunteers from Concordia University and the neighborhood (including my husband, Tom) to fill in all the holes with a massive load of donated gravel. Through people power, Habitat was able to accomplish something quickly and effectively that made a huge, positive difference in our lives. I have gotten to know some of the diverse Habitat homeowners who are my neighbors, and I am always heartened by their stories of resilience and the stability and hope they are finding with the support of their homes."

### Treasurer's Report

This year our congregation approved a budget that will finish the year on June 30, 2017 with a deficit of \$8,230. We can absorb the deficit this year in part because we had a large surplus last year, but now that we have a regular half-time minister again, our current level of pledges can't quite cover ongoing expenses.

In the first five months of this year, our finances are running just ahead of budget, with a YTD surplus of \$1500, mostly because expense is under budget in several categories. Our budget expects to run at a surplus for two more months due to seasonally high giving in December and January, then we budget running at a deficit for the rest of the year.
