General Assembly, or GA, as it's frequently known, is the annual business meeting and conference for the Unitarian Universalist Association. It features several thousand Unitarian Universalists gathering together for worship, approving social justice projects, attending a variety of workshops, and conducting the business of the Association. Because of our polity (a fancy word for our system of governance), delegates from the congregations vote on the President, currently Peter Morales, and the Moderator--Jim Key won this election--and vote on changes to our bylaws, and what social justice projects we should take on as a denomination. I didn't attend this year, though I plan to next year in Providence, RI. In 2015, General Assembly returns to Portland!

From the Minister *(Continued)*

But this year, instead of attending GA, I chose to take some time off. Minister's contracts typically call for four weeks of vacation time, and four weeks of study leave. I have not done a good job of being intentional about taking vacation or study leave. This summer, I realized I need to do a better job of this. Vacation is pretty self explanatory, but study leave is a strange concept to most people. Basically, Unitarian Universalist ministers are encouraged to take time for continuing education, both for conferences or workshops, and for reading and study, so I can bring you interesting, meaningful and thoughtful services over the next year. I also hope to spend time mapping out future services. I am always your minister, and always available for true emergencies, though I will not be responding to general emails while on vacation. I will return refreshed and ready to serve.

The last several years at Wy'east we've had a theme each year for our social justice collections. We've also endeavored to have 5 or 6 guest speakers each year that help us learn more about the theme. Last year, our theme was race, and we heard from a variety of speakers about their experiences as people of color living in Oregon. We raised money for a variety of grassroots organizations doing good work, and learned a lot about other people and their experiences.

This year, in consultation with the Worship Committee and the Board, we have decided to look at *privilege*. It isn't enough to hear about other people's experiences. Part of being a truly welcoming Beloved Community is to examine our own experiences, and see where we have benefited, often without realizing it, from the oppression of others. Over the next year, we will continue to look at race and sexual orientation--both issues we've looked at before--and also incorporate issues of class, ability, and mental health, among others. Our goal is not to make anyone ashamed of those places where we are part of the dominant culture, but to allow us to examine what it means to benefit

from unearned privilege. How can we become truly welcoming to different folks who may be interested in our liberal religion? How can we work with others for justice for everyone? Together, we will grapple with these and other hard questions. I hope you will join us on the journey.

Our team is: Carol B., Diane I., Amy N., Mary P., Mabel P., Barbara R. and Tricie R. (from a Tigard Presbyterian church). We have each attended a half day training and have visited the Goose Hollow Shelter to meet the families who are awaiting housing. We will soon be matched up with one of these families. Special Collections for July and August

On **July 28th**, our Special Collection will be for the **Compassionate Earth Walk**. This is a pilgrimage along the (tar sands oil) Keystone XL Pipeline route, to witness and call attention to the conflict between corporate and individual wants and actual limits. The walk will be from Hardesty, Alberta to Steele City, Nebraska, 1300 miles. Jon Biemer, a long-time Wy'east member, is taking part in the Walk, and will be speaking to us about it this day.

And on **August 18th**, our Special Collection is going to **Education for Haiti**, a project created by Rich Ireland, an old friend of both Larry B. and Mark A. in this congregation. Rich was in the Peace Corps in Haiti more than a dozen years ago, and here's what he has written about that experience, plus his work that came out of it.

"We see in the media many examples of the immense problems facing Haiti. One of the problems is access to education. Only 50% of the children go past sixth grade. Education for Haiti (E.F.H.) is addressing this need by working with families where I was in the town of Aquin, providing tuition through high school and beyond.

This is a program which has been operating since 2001 when I returned from the Peace Corps. Over that time I and a handful of friends have donated money to six families to assist their children's access to school. These families represent thirty-three children. In November of 2012 we discovered that the investment had wonderful success. Five have graduated from high school and three of those are pursuing professions in nursing, law and engineering. The other two would like to start nursing school. Seventeen are still attending school. Most of them want to go into a profession. There are two others who have established viable businesses.

E.F.H. is working to continue this legacy. Using this model, we plan on expanding it to other families. Once we commit to a family or child, our commitment is to stay with that support until they've finished their education. To put this in perspective -- less than 20% of Haitian children go to high school, and only about 9% graduate.

Economic development is essential for Haiti to address its needs. Teaching is one profession where educated Haitians can find work. Through supporting students we not only support their potential, but in a very real way contribute to the economy of Aquin."


COMPASSIONATE EARTH WALK AND THE ENVIRONMENTAL HANDPRINT
