Instead, let's look at the ways we can make our own corner of the world bright, especially here at Wy'east. Do you enjoy the work you do here? Many of our committed members give a great deal of time to Wy'east. Hopefully, they are fed by this work in some way. If it's not matching your personality or your passions, there are other opportunities available. Burnout is always a problem in congregations, perhaps especially one like ours where paid staff are in short supply and the vast majority of positions are volunteer. If you're beginning to feel burned out, I encourage you to speak with me—perhaps there are other areas that might be more inspiring to you.

And if you haven't yet found a place you fit in—let's talk about that as well. For many of us, the opportunity to become involved immediately with some basic tasks helped our sense of ownership and belonging at Wy'east. I've spoken with several members who noted that the first experience of helping put away hymnals or set up tables for potluck is what led them to become attached to this beloved community.

In this congregation, and in our broader lives, there is room for all of us to bloom. And, like flowers in a garden, the participation of each of us is needed to create a beautiful whole.

Social Justice Updates at Wy'east

Following up on Rev. Paul Davis' talk to us on February 19th about his Saturday morning, serving the homeless breakfast program in downtown Portland called St. Stephen's Table, a half a dozen members of Wy'east worked in the kitchen and serving on the morning of March 3rd. And then again on March 24th, eight people from Wy'east participated. A highlight of this program is that the more than one hundred homeless people who come there for breakfast are not just dished out food in a line, but are served at their tables like they were seated in a restaurant. Also, an important part of this is that those same individuals are "companioned" during these three hours on Saturday mornings - sat with, listened to, and related to because as human beings they matter.

Wy'east is now signed up for covering this program once a quarter, and if you're interested in participating, please see Mark Alter. Additionally, there was an exciting breakthrough aspect of this in that on March 24th, we were joined by eight members of First Unitarian Church downtown. Working together with them was great, and we are scheduled to be continuing this cooperation on the quarterly basis as noted above.

A member of Wy'east and her co-worker are also covering an evening group for LGBTQ homeless people downtown, which meets at St. Stephen's.



UU Symbiosis

On May 5 representatives from the local Portland Unitarian Universalist congregations will meet to discuss how we can cooperate with one another for mutual benefit and enjoyment. Some of the ideas that have come forward are:

- A Portland area UU website which describes the unique characteristics of each congregation and a link to individual websites. This is meant to be an aid to people seeking a church which meets their needs.
- Common social justice or environmental projects.
 Examples of this are the SOLV beach clean up and the breakfast program at St. Stephen's. These were joint project of Wy'east and First Unitarian Church of Portland.
- Common retreats or social occasions. Many of the smaller congregations do not have enough members to be able to offer a retreat, but a retreat opened to several congregations would make this more possible.
- A common Google email group which could be used to communicate events at Portland area UU congregations
- A unified voice on social justice and environmental issues.
- Collaboration on "technical" problems. We all have similar administrative problems. Sharing solutions helps us all.
- Speaker or Service exchange. Wy'east has had guest speakers from other UU congregations and other faiths. We have reciprocated by giving sermons at other congregations.

From the Board

I am currently the treasurer on the board of trustees for Wy'east. When I first came to Wy'east, I didn't know who was on the board or any committee, or exactly what qualified you to be on either. I remember a sense of relief during my first experience voting for board members, that there were just enough candidates for the positions to be filled. Kind of like some of the local county positions where you are asked to vote for no more than 7 and there are only 5 listed on the ballot.

I did not think I was board material. I didn't know that much about Unitarian Universalists or about running a church.

Then I was asked to be on a task force to search for a new minister. I met with an amazing group of people with diverse interests and experiences, and we put aside our personal wants and needs and instead thought about the congregation, working toward finding a minister who would be a good fit for Wy'east. It was energizing, rewarding, and fun—not at all scary or stressful. And the outcome was... well, wonderful. If you believe in it, it was a "match made in heaven;" if not, it was good Karma, fate or destiny, approaching nirvana or paradise, or just a good, logical, pragmatic approach that weighed what Marcia was looking for in a congregation to what Wy'east was looking for in a minster and found the match to be within the acceptable parameters of both. It works for all of these.

Later, when an announcement of the when and where of the next board meeting came with "anyone is welcome to attend," I thought I would go and see what happens in these meetings. Turns out it is again a group of wonderful people, with diverse interests, experience, and points of view who set aside their individual needs to think of what the congregation needs and try to find ways to fill those needs.

So come to a board meeting or a committee meeting, or ask about the many, many opportunities there are to volunteer here at Wy'east. You may have a lot of reasons for thinking you may not want to be on the board or a committee. Come to a meeting first before you rule it out. I'm sure you might have heard it as a child; as a father, I have said it many, many times, "How do you know you don't like it if you don't try it?"
