Central to these efforts is our work to develop an active and coordinated alliance of diverse interests dedicated to making the restoration of the Columbia River a regional and national priority.

from the website: In the early 1990s, fierce division and acrimony prevailed in every corner of the natural resources management sector. Lines were drawn in the dirt,

lawsuits were filed, and relationships between industry, environmentalists, and government were toxic. The battle was commonly portrayed as "Jobs vs. The Environment." Amidst this crisis over how to manage natural resources, Sustainable Northwest was born. Our first assignment was to facilitate discussions in Wallowa about the county's future. 18 years later, communities around the region look to successes across Oregon, Washington, and Idaho for examples of how to manage natural resources in ways that support the community, strengthen the local economy, and restore the environment.

Portland People's Climate March

On September 21st several Wy'east members attended the Portland edition of the People's Climate March, which was part of a worldwide event, featuring a huge march in New York City, with over 300,000 people telling world leaders that people are ready for strong action against climate change. Portland's featured about 5,000 people gathering on Waterfront Park. Many attendees were dressed in colorful costumes, carrying many signs calling for clean energy and for eliminating fossil fuels. We heard several speakers, ranging from Governor Kitzhaber, an organizer from OPAL Environmental Justice (a previous Wy'east Special Collection recipient), a union leader, and different religious leaders.

Several people spoke of the need for a sustainable society so that we don't fail the next generation. They emphasized that building a sustainable economy must become part of our lives. Our economy and our society are part of the environment, so repairing the environment involves repairing our society and ourselves.

Rev. Mark Knutson from Augustana Lutheran Church prayed that the world would take strong action to reduce climate change: "May generations to come not curse, but praise us." He remembered how at a 1994 environmental conference, the representative from Mozambique said we are separated from the world and each other, and environmental problems represent a spiritual crisis.

My favorite part was a red, white and blue sign worn by a woman: "Clean Energy is Patriotic." Yes!
