From the Minister ♦♦♦

It's a beautiful February day as I write this—clear and sunny. The kind of day that portends spring—or maybe just the kind of day that gets us through the long stretches of late winter grey.

Helping Immigrants & Refugees become Part of Our Community

You may remember that our special collection in December was for Lutheran Community Services' (LCS') Reception & Placement Program. This program welcomes and assists refugees as they get settled in the Portland, Vancouver and Seattle areas. Volunteer sponsors—often family members, close friends, congregations or other organizations—greet arriving refugees at the airport, arrange accommodations, provide food and furniture, and orient the refugees to daily life in their new home. Case managers—able to speak the refugee's language—help newly-arrived refugees process paperwork and secure governmental assistance, enter employment programs, attend ESL classes, and generally find solutions to any

problems that arise in the resettlement process. The Reception & Placement Program is vital in advancing refugees towards self-sufficiency.

While Wy'east cannot sponsor a family right now, Stefani Bloch of LCS told us that donations of smaller household and hygiene items are always much appreciated. As you go about your travels and spring cleaning, please set aside the following new hygiene items and new (or gently used) kitchen supplies. The Social Justice chalice circle will collect the items and deliver them to LCS (date to collect your items TBD; please stay tuned).

The chalice circle will also reach out to local stores and giving programs of companies that make these types of products, in order to extend our donations. Items most needed include:

- bar soap
- shampoo
- shaving cream
- toothpaste and toothbrushes
- feminine hygiene products
- body lotion
- baby supplies: diapers, wipes, baby wash & shampoo
- pots and pans
- cutlery
- plates, bowls, glasses, mugs
- mixing bowls
- wooden spoons, spatulas
- tea kettles
- dish towels
- dish soap

The only thing that isn't appropriate for kitchen items are the fancier electronics, like food processors and electric can openers, which some families may not know how to use.

From the RE Committee

Dear Wy'casters,

If you've stood up to sing the children off with 'This Little Light of Mine' recently you may have noticed you're holding your hands higher and longer lately.

Thanks to a great many visitors, and a few new



members, our Religious Education program has been growing!

I have to say that a big reason for my

being a part of the RE program comes from the joy I get seeing parents who make that first big step, waking up early on a Sunday morning and getting out of the house to try something new for the sake of their children. I believe many of these parents are looking for a way to teach their children how to find connection to something beyond our everyday experience. Whether it's finding a safe and welcoming community, or finding answers to those questions that get bigger each passing day, or deciding there is more to raising a healthy child than providing square meals and homework help, whatever the reason, we at Wy'cast RE are aspiring to create a warm, welcoming space in which anyone can feel at home.

Currently our program is split into two groups, middle school aged and above, elementary school aged and below. We have one volunteer teacher, Anders L., and three paid staff: teachers Ashley M., and Rose T., and childcare giver, Anne S. This model has worked well to meet the needs of our program so far. However the needs of our program are changing as we welcome new members.

We have been doing a fair amount of planning in these past weeks. Anders L. is working to see his middle-school program expand and grow beyond the four walls of Wee Works as his children get to an age where making visits to other places of faith and worship is possible. For some children, making the move from discussions of the world's faiths to the action of witnessing is a life-changing shift in learning. We hope to get there sometime in 2011.

Ashley M. and Rose T. are on the verge of launching a third program to present to a newly formed pre-school aged group. This upcoming curriculum will be an introduction to community building and group participation for our youngest members. We'll be learning how we can step forward, reach out a hand and request, or offer acceptance to another person.

Speaking of reaching out that hand... our need for volunteer classroom assistants in RE is as great now as it has ever been. For our current members, and for our future visitors, we strive to create a safe place for learning. Often the presence of one extra adult is enough to allow our teachers to shift from child herding to program presentation. If you have not already, please step forward and reach out that hand.
